Better than dirt

2-year effort turns median into showcase

once-bare median on Abrego Drive just north of Esperanza Boulevard has been given new life thanks to the perseverance of Fairways I homeowner and Master Gardener Bettye Jo Preis.

Preis had hoped the Fairways Property Owners Association would approve having the volunteer group Me- a face lift in April. dianGreen do the work but when the request was denied because of cost, get the permits and approval to take on the job.

"The median had only one agave century plant on it. The rest was bare dirt," she said.

From fall 2011, when she began the process of finding the right person in Pima County's Real Property Division, to May 14, 2013, when she signed a Right of Way License Agreement giving her responsibility for several medians, Preis' determination has paid off.

and III, Preis pitched her plan to raise Agave and Santa Rita Prickly Pear money at HOA meetings.

"Homeowners gave from \$1 to \$1,000, and everything in between. They dropped money into jars at homeowners meetings and contributed by mail,' she said. "I wrote 'thank you' notes."

She was successful in raising \$2,000 and work began in last May.

Preis spoke with MedianGreen founder Susanne Blodgett, who was helpful in directing her to the Green Valley Fire District, which agreed to fill a 132-gallon cistern twice a month. A second cistern was recently purchased for median two, which will get

Preis' daughter Robin Shifflet, who is in charge of landscape architecture Preis launched a two-year mission to for the City of San Diego, drew up the initial landscape plan. It was rejected because it included trees that could cause visibility problems for traffic; full-grown plants can't be taller than three feet. Several medians on Abrego have trees and tall saguaro cacti exceeding three feet but are not at significant intersections.

When the second plan was approved, Preis and her daughter went to Civano Nursery in Tucson and selected Green Cloud Texas Rangers, Euphorbia, Bear

plants. They require minimal watering, are resistant to disease, insects and hungry desert animals, and with time will provide color.

They bought 57 plants wholesale, and Civano delivered them. Planting was done in one day by Ruth Gleason and her crew with C&D Landscaping of Amado.

Fairways homeowner Richard Arnold has been helping Preis with watering. When the heat arrives and he leaves for the northwest, she hopes other homeowners will pitch in.

Seven medians on Abrego are within the Fairways neighborhood, stretching from Verde Vista near Esperanza south to Del Rio. Preis is planning to make another request for funds at the annual homeowners meeting this month to plant medians two and three. She is also asking homeowners who have cactus and drought-tolerant plants to donate to contact her.

Bill would move GV into Santa **Cruz County**

State Sen. Gail Griffin on Tuesday breathed life into a bid to bring Green Valley, Sahuarita and the mines into Santa Cruz County, though the idea hasn't proven popular

Griffin, a Republican whose District 14 skirts the eastern edge of Green Valley, introduced SB 1357, which would put a boundary change to a vote in Santa Cruz County and to those affected in southern Pima County.

"What I'm hoping for is open dialogue by people who are affected," Griffin said late Tuesday. She said she has received "lots of calls" about moving the boundary, and "I haven't heard from anybody who doesn't want to do it."

Griffin said she introduced the bill at the request of constituents, doesn't expect to

have trouble getting it through the Legislature, and wants to hear "about any possible unintended consequences" it may bring about.

"I want to hear all sides of the issue."

Emmett McLoughlin, a former Tucson City Council member who lives in Sonoita, formed the Santa Cruz County Committee for Quality Jobs more than a year ago to explore moving the county line from Amado to Pima Mine Road, which is where Griffin's bill would put it.

McLoughlin said Tuesday night that a boundary change would add 798 square miles to Santa Cruz County, including Green Valley, Sahuarita and Corona de Tucson, along with the Freeport-McMoRan and Asarco mines and the proposed

Rosemont Mine. "I think it's going all

Some help looking at the stars

If you received a telescope as a gift recently but don't know how to use it, don't despair. From Sierra Vista to Green Valley to Tucson, professional and amateur astronomers are ready and willing to help get you started. Even if you don't own a telescope, you

can join the fun. Some of that fun happens on a regular basis at Starizona, a Tucson shop that sells telescopes, designs and sells specialized astrophotography equipment, and

and Saturday night, weather permitting, amateur astronomers assemble in the parking lot at 5757 N. Oracle Road to stargaze and experiment with astrophotography.

Novices are welcome. On a clear, cold Friday night in early January, enthusiasts gather in a small cordoned-off area to set up their telescopes. Southern Arizona is known for its dark skies, but on Oracle Road not far from Tucson Mall, some light is inescapable.

What the parking lot lacks in dark skies is more than made up

hosts star parties. Every Friday for by the excitement generated as an assortment of telescopes, many looking like the Star Wars character R2-D2 on stilts, are assembled shortly before dusk.

> Automated or computerized telescopes with internal global positioning systems are among the favorites. Using a hand control, the user points, or "slews," an automated telescope to three bright celestial objects. The telescope's internal software models the night sky based upon the locations of the three objects.
